

WOLVERINE

Wolverine pelts are not sorted into different sections.
Most wolverines are harvested in the northern areas of Canada and Alaska.

SIZE

XXL	Over 89 cm	Over 35"
XL	81–89 cm	32"–35"
LGE	Under 81 cm	Under 32"

COLOUR

The most important characteristic in the wolverine is contrast between the light and dark portions of the pattern on the back. The more distinct the pattern the more desirable the pelt. The main colours are: double extra pale, extra pale, pale, brown and dark brown

CLARITY

1	CLEAR	Bright, with little or no red or yellow cast.
2	SLIGHT OFF	Yellowish tinge.
3	OFF	Distinct red or yellow cast.

CATALOGUE SECTION I

CODE	GRADE	DEFINITION
I	FIRST	Fur is of strong density, fully covered. Leather and fur are free of imperfections.
I-II	FIRST AND SECOND	Flanks may be slightly open, lacking density in under wool. Leather and fur are free of imperfections.
II	SECOND	lack finish, density and coverage. Early pelts will be flat and later pelts may be rubbed. Leather and fur are free of imperfections.
SDG	SLIGHT DAMAGED	DGD (Gd.): Good quality pelts with small, repairable imperfections. DGD (Pr.): Average quality pelts with small, repairable imperfections.

CATALOGUE SECTION III

CODE	GRADE	DEFINITION
DGD	DAMAGED	DGD (Gd.): Good quality pelts with 25% loss of fur. DGD (Pr.): Average quality pelts with 25% loss of fur, or Good quality pelts with more severe damage.
III	THIRD	Poor quality pelts.
